

AF Drum, Bugle Corps Due for Show



Fine Performances in Store

This year's fine field of Pumpkin Show entertainment will be highlighted by the U. S. Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps and Bagpipe Band.

This will be the second Pumpkin Show engagement for the two units. They appeared here in 1958 to make a solid hit with show goers.

The snappy Air Force musicians replace the U. S. Army Field Band which performed last year. The Drum and Bugle Corps and pipe bandmen will give daily performances at the CHS football field.

Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday shows will begin at 7 p.m. On Friday night the units will perform at halftime of the Circleville-Greenfield football game.

THE official USAF Drum and Bugle Corps is an integral part of the famed United States Air Force Band, though the Corps operates as a separate unit. Under the supervision of Colonel George S. Howard, Chief of Bands and Music, USAF, the Corps was organized in 1959 at its home station, Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D. C.

From a modest beginning in which performances were limited to its home station, the Corps has achieved international acclaim, becoming the most sought-after unit of its kind in the world. Traveling thousands of miles yearly, the Corps has won the admiration of millions in Europe, the Middle East, Africa, and the Far East as well as throughout the United

States and Canada. In 1956, the Corps represented the United States and the United States Air Force at the World's Fair in Brussels, Belgium.

The marching unit consists of 20 bagpipers, 12 drummers, and six bagpipers, the latter attired in the traditional highland dress. The officer-in-charge is Chief Warrant Officer Henry R. Ukland, a native of Raymond, Washington.

Noncommissioned officer-in-charge and musical director is Master Sergeant Truman W. Crawford of Kutztown, N. Y. The Drum Major is Staff Sergeant Glenn Broome of York, Penn.

Bugle chief is Staff Sergeant Ricardo Galea of Miami, Fla. Drum chief is Staff Sergeant Robert Goodhart of Reading, Penn. and the pipe major is Technical Sergeant Melvin Ross of Natick, Mass.

THE bagpipe band is a unique and colorful part of the official United States Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps. With a nucleus of six airmen, none of whom had ever played bagpipes, the Pipe Band was organized in 1959 under the tutelage of William Gallosay, and former

pipe major of the British Army's "Black Watch". Since 1954 the Pipe Band has been under the leadership of Technical Sergeant Ross. Under Pipe Major Ross, the Pipe Band performs frequently as an independent unit in addition to its regular performances on the march and during field shows with the Corps. For all of their appearances, the pipers wear authentic highland dress, the tartan of the Mitchell clan in honor of General Billy Mitchell.

Many Bands Slated for Show Events

Approximately 25 bands are scheduled for Pumpkin Show appearances, according to program director James Shea.

Shea said this is probably the largest number ever of musical units slated at a Pumpkin Show. This does not include the Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps and other similar contingents.

Many of the bands are scheduled for individual performances at Court and Main Sts. and on W. Main St. Many also are slated to march in the various parades during the show.

The Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps is due for daily evening performances at the CHS football field. Performing along with the unit will be the Air Force Bagpipe Band.
