Top events in the Junior Fair schedule will be the Beef Cattle Showmanship and Fitting Wednesday afternoon, the Dairy Showmanship Contest Friday afternoon and the 4-H and F. F. A. Auction Sale of Fat Steers, swine and lambs Friday night.

Both the Beef Showmanship and Auction Sale have been moved this year from the round cattle barn to the big Tent Arena on the north side of the race track.

A new competitive event will be the Tractors Operators Contest for 4-H and F. F. A. members scheduled Friday from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m.

From the roaring west this year comes Cherokee Hammond's Championship Wild West Rodeo to thrill fairgoers, Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings.

The WLW Midwestern Hayride country and western revue featuring the Lucky Pennies and young Mike Morton, vocalist, will appear

Wednesday evening.

Free acts brought by the Fair Board will be presented each afternoon and evening on the race track stage. These include "Comille's Dogs," billed as the world's largest dog act with 20 animals and Paige and Jewett's "Fun On Wheels."

Different high school bands will play at the grandstand on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. On Saturday the Adelphi Community Band, directed by Rhoderick Shaw, will provide the music.

In the Art and Agricultural Halls, will be the annual Fall Flower Show of the Fairfield County Federated Garden Clubs, the Lancaster Rose Club's display, the exhibits of six county schools, the 4-H food and dress displays, the Fine Arts exhibit of paintings.
