

BABE PARADE BEAUTY PART OF FESTIVAL

Record Number of Cherubs Take Part In Pageant of Infancy Friday.

There are no lovelier children in the whole world than those in the baby parade on Friday afternoon of the Silver Jubilee Pumpkin Show. The 142 cherubs entered is the largest number ever to parade and it was with greatest difficulty that prizes were awarded.

Rolling along in the carriages bright with color, the babes were indifferent to all the excitement about them. They presented a sight that evinced murmurs and applause from the thousands of spectators that crowded the main streets of the town.

Each mother's darling was supreme in its realm of babyhood, and the interest shown by the parents of Circleville, who entered their children, was most commendable for the officials in charge.

Joseph Brown, 21-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Brown, in the silver airplane "The Spirit of Circleville" was the first novelty outfit. The two storks; the doctor and nurse; the Indian; the fairy queen; Dutch outfit; the baker; the mechanics; the girl with the cat that drank out of a milk bottle, and all the beautiful carriages decorated for the occasion in every color of the rainbow, all helped to make the parade the biggest success of years.

The Carbone band and the Adelphi band furnished good music for those who pushed the carriages.

A part of the parade that was well patronized and deserving of praise was the class for colored babies. They had some novelty outfits that showed work and ingenuity. Two represented "Injun uity," one with war feathers and another pulling an Indian vehicle.

At the conclusion of the parade which wound up on Pinkney-st. the judging began with the entries lining both sides of the street and with a third row in the middle.
