Thousands of persons, estimated varying from five to eight thousand, attended the opening of the new Chillicothe high school, Friday night.

The auditorium, seating 1062, was jammed for the dedication program while people stood in every available spot inside and other thousands milled through the hallways inspecting the three floors and basement of the beautiful new plant.

Automobiles were parked in every available space for blocks around, seemingly extending from the Country Club to the canal and from Chestnut to beyond Allen avenue on the cross streets.

Impressive dedication services started promptly at 8 o'clock and lasted but one hour, although they were followed by an hour's band concert by the I. O. O. F. band, under the direction of Will Huff.

Music was furnished during the dedication program by the Chillicothe high school orchestra, with Russel N. Squire conducting.

Following the invocation of Rev. Theodore Franke, Superintendent W. L. Miller, who presided, introduced Mrs. A. M. Davidson, who presented to the school, on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary, the large picture, "The Birth of the Flag," which hangs in one of the study halls.

A flag on a standard, for use on the stage, was presented by Mrs. Knox Amos on behalf of the Women's Relief Corps, and Col. T. S. Pettison represented the American Legion in the presentation of a large flag to hang from the staff in front of the building.

The gifts were accepted on behalf of the Chillicothe high school students by Mary Ann Schlegel.

With a few words of praise for his assistants, the members of the Chillicothe Board of Education, and all those who participated in the construction of the building, Frederick W. Garber of Garber and Woodward, Cincinnati architects, presented the building to the school board with these words, "I hope you enjoy it as much as we have enjoyed building it for and with you."
