Seven SEO Bands Entered in Logan Armistice Day Parade

Monday Evening Deadline for Float Entries

Committee Says Other Vehicles To Enter March

Seven truck southeastern Ohio high school bands will march in the annual Armistice Day parade Thursday, members of the veterans' committee in charge of arrangements announced today.

The bands will be led by the 150-member Logan High School band under the direction of James H. Houch. Other bands will include Champaign-Dever, Murray City, McArthur, Union Furnace, Bunch Hill, Carlton Hill. The widely known Laurelville-Adelphi band of adults also is expected to participate. Floats will be awarded the winners of the band contest in various classes.

With Monday as the deadline for entering floats in the parade, members of the committee said that five floats have been registered thus far.

They include the following organizations: Young Women's Christian Association, Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, American Legion Auxiliary and Logan High. Jimmy Schultz will enter a float as an individual.

Several school buses, a large number of decorated automobiles and societies also will be entered in the parade.

The various bands will be interspersed in the parade formation, with the Logan group leading.

Woman Is Injured As Auto Overtakes

One woman was injured Monday morning when the car in which she was riding swerved off the road and overturned in a ditch on State Route 33 near the Five-Mile Inn.

She was Mrs. Lon Coakley, 68, of Nelsonville Route 2, who suffered shock, bruises and cuts. She received emergency treatment at the office of a local physician and was taken to the Hocking Valley Hospital.

Deputy Sheriff Lloyd Fraizer, who investigated the accident, said that the car was driven by Mrs. Emma Winkler, also of Nelsonville Route 2. She suffered only minor bruises.

Reorganization Plan Not Fully Endorsed by Group

Samuel H. Dillon, county superintendent of schools and president of the Ohio County Superintendents' Association, today issued a statement supplementing the association's report adopted Friday.

The association, meeting in Columbus, adopted a report calling for reorganization of school units in Ohio for greater economy and efficiency.

Mr. Dillon pointed out that the association's report is an alternative, submitted for the recommendations of the Conference of Deans of Ohio's five state universities.

It was felt by the county superintendents, Mr. Dillon said, that proposed application of the criteria found in the "deans' report would not be applicable to the rural schools of Ohio.

The report of the Ohio county superintendents, in its entirety, does not necessarily reflect the thinking of all of the county superintendents in the state, he reported. Because conditions differ so widely in various counties, the report was, of necessity, a compromise measure, he added.

"It is obvious that certain areas in Hocking County would not, at present, fit into the plan because of sparsity of population and poor road conditions," Mr. Dillon stated.

"Whatever reorganization seems desirable in Hocking County should be done voluntarily after a complete study has been made of the areas involved. No district should be forced to join another district against its wishes," he concluded.
