## Hike Proposed In Fair Admission

The Ross County Fairboard's executive committee has been asked to consider raising the price of admission to the fairgrounds from 50 cents to 75 cents or \$1.

Bennett W. Junk, a new member of the board, suggested the move.

Wayne Cryder, board president, said he feels the board should not increase admission until it can offer better grandstand shows and at the same time open them to free admission.

Several members of the board agreed price increases should be contingent with adding free shows and making grandstand evening performances free.

At present, the board has a contact with Stoney Roberts,

who for several years has closed out the fair on Saturday with an auto thrill show. Under the contract admission to the grandstand would have to be charged this year.

A Wednesday horse show and Thursday wrestling match also charge at the grandstand and admission is charged for the harness racing program.

The board can open the grandstand for the Wednesday horse show and for racing but the wrestling would still not be a free attraction, they indicated.

The board passed a motion to invest \$13,000 of \$13,510 received from the state in parimutuel funds.

The money will be invested for 91 days in treasury bills.

Junk made a motion to prohibit use of the fairgrounds by any group not connected with the fair the two weeks prior to fair opening.

The motion was made after James Starr, junior fair adviser, reported 4-H members have not had much time to prepare booths for the fair because their building was in use.

It was reported some materials are on the grounds for construction of a new horse barn.

Members of 4-H have been on the grounds the last two weekends repairing their horse barns and a workout area.

M. A. Moore, program director, said a high school band will be lined up for each day this year. The Adelphi Community Band will play for the harness racing.
