## PLAN SUMMER CONCERTS HERE

**Musicians Union Propose Enlargement of I.O.O.F. Band and Concert Series**

Enlargement of the I. O. O. F. band and the resumption of the band concerts which proved to be so popular here before the war has been decided upon, Musicians Union No. 524 announced Wednesday following a recent meeting of their organization.

It is the intention of the union to use every musician who can handle classic, concert music or popular music and as the I. O. O. F. band is the active organization here at present it was decided that the name would be continued. After making a canvas of the musicians of the city it was found that there will be from 35 to 40 available.

The present plan of the union is to give a concert once a week preferably on Sunday after the ball games finishing before darkness falls and giving those who desire plenty of time to attend church.

Every fraternal order and business man of the city has been told of the plan and asked to give their support in order that Chillicothe may enjoy concert music at least once a week during the coming season.

An indoor concert to help provide the funds for the outfitting of the organization will be given in the near future. The entire proceeds of this fund will be given to the cause and this will constitute the musicians own personal contribution. Fraternal societies and business men will be asked to get behind the move and support it financially in so far as they can.

It is estimated that the cost of the concerts will be from \$1,000 to \$1,200 for a ten weeks course and placing the things the men will be giving the public in the balance, it is found that their instruments, tal-

ent, uniforms and library of music would total up to \$9,500

The plan has been placed in the hands of a committee of six of which Adam H. Uhrig is chairman. Members of the committee are, Walter Hess, Wm. Huff, W. Agin, Charles Buchanan and Carl Uhrig.
