

and to disarm the police. The police ordered the crowd to disperse and when this order was ignored, the officers opened fire and threw hand grenades into the mob.

Communist leaders tried to hold a mass demonstration, but the police had erected a barbed wire entanglement around the field desired for use and had stationed armored cars at strategic points. The crowd stoned the cars. Street car service was virtually suspended during the day and some streets have been barred.

London, March 24.—(By Associated Press.)—The Communists revolt in Germany, financed, it is declared, by Soviet gold, is spreading throughout the industrial district of middle Germany, threatening the great ammonia, potash, anthracite and copper works, says a Central News Dispatch from Berlin today. Crown police forces have been dispatched to the centers whose trouble has grown out of the recent demand of the leaders for a general strike and the arming of the proletariat.

Efforts of the authorities, adds the dispatch, have only resulted in the Communists strengthening their stand.
