## Two Movements For Sunday Band Concerts Disclosed

Two echoes have reverberated from the Gazette's recent editorial concerning Sunday band concerts in the city park.

One is from the Musicians' Union to which all members of the band that has been giving the concerts for years belong. They propose to go before Council and Mayor Gunning and ask that money be appropriated for the concerts as a relief measure for they have quite a number of their musicians who have lost positions through recent railroad shifts in the city and are without any means of support at all. An appropriation would help

them materially as well as assure the public of a form of entertainment the popularity of which is unquestioned.

The other echo comes from Rev. H. H. Abels, pastor of the Chillicothe Larger M. E. Parish who has a band among his parishioners and who has made arrangements with the park board to provide concerts in the park each Sunday afternoon beginning June 19.

The parish band was organized in January, 1931, and has a membership of between 25 and 30, mostly young men and women of high school age. It has played at numerous picnics, fish fries, church festivals, including a concert at the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus when it was here last Fall.

On all these occasions the young musicians have nobly acquitted themselves and their instructors, Mr. and Mrs. Will Huff. It is expected that the band will have been materially increased in size before June, as invitations are being extended to musicians of the county to join and it is planned to secure a hall in the city for practice purposes.

It is the plan of Rev. Abels to make the concerts a county-wide project with an added feature of a half hour's address by a clergyman of the city or county. He expects to enlist all the pastors in this feature, and have a different pastor, regardless of denomination, give an address each afternoon. The concerts will start at 2 p. m., with the half hour speaking program coming between 2:45 and 3:15, when the concert will be resumed and continue until 4 p. m.

The concerts will require no financial support as all the musicians give their services gratis.
