It had rained the morning before during the concert on the Capitol steps. At 11:30 the group boarded the buses and returned to the capitol where, until 4:30, they were on their own to do and see whatever interested them. Some visited the White House, and although there was no tour to be had there, the band leader, 90 year old Mr. Connett, after someone had a little talk with a guard, he alone was taken into the White House for a tour.

Others went to the Smithsonian Institute and various other places of interest. At 4:30 p.m. everyone returned to Mt. Vernon for supper at a big smorgasbord restaurant. The. restaurant was supposed to be closed at that hour, but thanks to the bus drivers making a special request to the operators, they allowed just the Adelphi band group to come in for the evening

It was back to the motel after that and to bed to be ready for the trip home the next morning. On Thursday they were up and loaded by 7 a.m. and ontheir way home, arriving in Adelphi at 6:15 Thursday evening.
