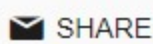
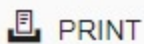

## Local Cannery Facing Big Labor Problem As Packing Season Opens

With 50,000 man work-hours required to handle the pea crop and with the present work force able to provide only 30,000 hours of that time the Winorr Canning Co. faced a difficult problem Friday as the canning season opened.

In order to can the pea crop produced locally each of the full-time workers at the plant would have to work 100 hours a week for the next month, which is an impossibility, officials of the company said Friday. "We must have additional help or a lot of valuable food will go to waste," a company spokesman said.

The Jaycees have pledged 104 man hours of extra work each week and the Kiwanis club will provide 57 hours.

In explaining the situation the cannery declared that regular employees can work only so long and then require relief for a few hours. It is to provide this relief that volunteers are sought. Men and women volunteering for work are paid the regular rates.

If this pea crop is to be processed this Spring then many men and women who never before have worked in factories will have to join the force. Persons willing to assume a part of responsibility for saving the crop are urged to call the Winorr office and specify the

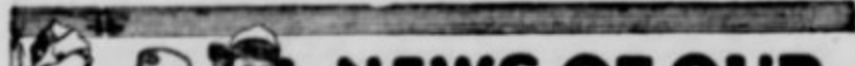
days of the week and the hours they will be available. Help is needed at once. Scores of regular jobs are going begging.
