Outlook Good For Lurleen



HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) -Can-

cer specialists said today Gov. Lurleen Wallace of Alabama "spent a very restful night" after an operation which may rid her of a malignancy. A bulletin issued by M.D. An-

derson Hospital and Tumor Institute said Mrs. Wallace sat on the side of her bed this morn-Her doctors said they

"pleased with her progress" and that all of the vital signssuch as pulse, heart beat and respiratory rate - are normal. The hospital said the gover-

nor will return to Alabama within two or three weeks "if no complications develop" during the post-operative period. A cancerous tumor in the lower abdomen was removed Mon-

day during an operation that lasted almost 5 hours. One of her doctors said afterward, "We found nothing that would prevent" the governor's complete recovery.

It was her second operation for cancer in 18 months.

Her husband, former Gov. George Wallace, whose concern for his wife's health had become increasingly visible, said he was "elated" and "very thankful" the doctors' encouaging prophecy.
