

Annual Laurelville Firemen's Festival Adds Baking Contest To Attractions

The annual Firemen's Old-Time Festival at Laurelville will be an event of Tuesday through Saturday, July 18-22, with a full schedule of activities planned. All proceeds will go to the fire department for equipment and building improvements.

Something new in the way of contests has been added, with a baking contest open to all persons living within the Laurelville fire district.

The opening ceremony will get underway at 7:15 p.m. on Tuesday, July 18, highlighted by a Little King and Queen contest, followed by a sing-along by area churches.

The Miss Volunteer Fireman contest will be featured at 8 p.m. Wednesday, followed by a concert by the Adelphi band.

On Thursday, judging of baked goods will take place at 8 p.m., with entries to be at the firehouse between 4 and 7 p.m. Jack Bartley, former WRFD

disc jockey, will be featured from 8 to 10 p.m.

The rock band "Bad Nite" will be featured from 8 to 11 p.m. Friday, along with judging of old-time festival costumes.

On Saturday a pony pull will be held at 1 p.m. and a big parade at 6 p.m., followed by a square dance on Young's Foodtown parking lot and country and western music on the stage by Bob Smart.

Classes for the baked goods contest include:

Section I, Cakes — Best chocolate layer, iced; best white layer, iced; best yellow layer, iced; best of any other kind.

Section II, Cookies — Best drop; best bar or brownies or best rolled.

Section III, Yeast bread and rolls — White bread; dinner rolls (four on a paper plate); sweet rolls.

Section IV, Pies — Fruit or

filled (bake pies in aluminum pie pans).

All cakes must be entered on heavy cardboard, pies in aluminum pie pans, and cookies and rolls on paper plates. Exhibits will be released after 8 p.m. Saturday.

Area churches will be selling homemade pies and firemen will sell fish sandwiches again this

year.

Laurelville firemen said advance sale ride tickets are now on sale, and can be purchased from any fireman until Sunday.

Advance tickets, providing for five rides, are sold at \$1, compared to the regular \$2 value.

The final sale of advance tickets will be from 1 to 4 p.m. at the village fire house.
