Laurelville Old Time Fireman's Festival fun raises funds

LAURELVILLE — The Fireman's Festival burned on until midnight Saturday as square dancers sashayed and Silver Spur played on the main streets of Laurelville.

The annual festival, celebrating its 84th year this summer, was one of the best that Laurelville Fire Chief Butch Valentine could remember.

"Everything's been fantastic; we've had good weather and a good turnout every night ---Mother Nature's been treating us well," he said.

Valentine has been with the Laurelville Volunteer Fire Department for 35 years, and this year marks his 19th as fire chief.

The Grand Parade

The festival's stats increased on all fronts this year- including the food department. The firemen thawed more than 1,700 pounds of fish for the nightly fish fry. And at least 118 floats, tractors, cars and trucks joined the Grand Parade, compared to only 80 entries last year.

The winning float on Saturday was from the Amanda Township Firefighter's Festival. The festival's Queen and her court wore matching red gowns, accented by fire extinguishers that lined their float. Second place went to the South Bloomfield Old Village Days float, and the Deer Creek Dam Days float took third.

Lifelong Laurelville resident Paul Smith was honored as the parade's Grand Marshal.

The fire department presented Smith with a clock plaque and Valentine thanked him for the 40 years of service he's given the volunteer fire department.
