Clarksburg Field Day Events Planned

CLARKSBURG—Several new attractions will be added to the 54th annual Clarksburg Field Day which is scheduled July 31 at the United Methodist Church grounds north of Clarksburg.

Chairman Bennett W. Junk said the new attractions are the Senior Citizens Band from Columbus and a garden tractor pull.

The band is composed of persons who reside in a Columbus retirement village.

The garden tractor pull is a contest similar to regular tractor pulls, the difference being in size of the tractors.

The all-day celebration will also feature "other activities for all ages," Junk said. For adults, there will be trapshooting and horseshoe pitching, beginning at 10 a.m. and continuing until a champion has emerged.

There will be pony rides and games — including the tra-

ditional greased pole climb — for youngsters.

Other musical entertainment will be provided by the Adelphi Band, at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. The senior citizens band is to play at 2:45 p.m. At 8:15 p.m. there will be music by Mike Cutright and the Country Rhythm Masters with the Bolles Brothers appearing at 8:45 p.m.

Junk noted there will be extensive commercial exhibits and area firms are encouraged to display farm products and equipment.

While attendance was around 2,500 last year, Junk expects "about 3,000" this year.

Proceeds from the field day go for improvements of the Clarksburg United Methodist Church, which sponsors the event. Junk said funds were used last year to paint the church parsonage. The church itself is to be painted this year.
