

Bachelor's Dream Two-Heat Ross Fair Victor

Bachelor's Dream, owned and driven by Forrest W. Jones of Cedarville, took a muddy track in stride and scored the only double victory in heats on the second day of harness racing at the Ross County Fair Friday. Pacing a field of seven in times of 2:22 2/5 and 2:19 4/5, Bachelor's Dream picked up the Templin and Griesheimer Trophy.

Heavy Track
Racing on the heavy track was made possible only through a pre-race two-hour "merry-go-round" of cars, trucks, tractors and other vehicles seeking to pack the clay on which the horses would run.

Mudder Bachelor's Dream won what originally was tabbed as the second division of the 28 pace, because shortly before post time the first division was postponed until Saturday.

Spanish Dancer and Johnny Glow put on a 3-1, 1-3 split in the 28 trot. Spanish Dancer, owned and driven by Emmett Ebenhach of Circleville, caught driver Wendell Kirk's Mr. Jim G. at the pole in the initial heat. Johnny Glow finished third.

Lead Early
Johnny Glow took the lead early in the second race, and, unlike the first when he faltered late, this run he kept them chasing him the whole way, winning in 2:19 4/5. On the basis of time, Spanish Dancer, third in the heat, was placed second on a 2:22 3/5 clocking in the first race.

Johnny Glow, the trotter of Edward T. Dean of Springfield, was presented the Marathon Petroleum Trophy.

Only 5 Horses
Because of late scratches, only five horses competed in the semi-final division of the two-year old and 30 trot, quite a mixed horse race. Therefore all five of each division made the trip to the final round, although two scratched before the last race.

Golden Gift, Tilden Richards (Washington C.H.) partially converted pacer, trotted beautifully to a comfortable victory in 2:26 4/5 for the first heat.

Dixanna Doctor, driven by Ken Appleman for Dixanna Farms, Pickerington, registered a victory in the second division in a slower time of 2:31 4/5.

Neither Challenged

When the battle for the John Heiby trophy came around, neither of these horses challenged. Golden Gift couldn't decide whether to pace or trot and got left at the starting gate. Dixanna Doctor ended fifth, way back in the pack. Lone Kay, who finished second to Golden Gift in the first division, copped the honors in 2:26 4/5. L. J. Carler drove the trotter for Miss Nellie Paxton Moore of Xenia.

Starting Judge for Friday's program was Glenn Parks of Plain City, replacing Waverly's H. H. Butler, who was called away.

Presented Colors
Miss Sharon Jackson of Frankfurt presented the colors on horseback and the Adelphi Community Band played for the benefit of the crowd of 400. Admission to the grandstands was free Friday. Outrider again was Robert H. Beard.

Victor Miller of Columbus handled the announcements with well-chosen patter about the horses and their backgrounds; his announcing was interspersed with many pertinent facts about harness racing.

The last harness races for this year's fair take place at 2 p.m. Saturday.

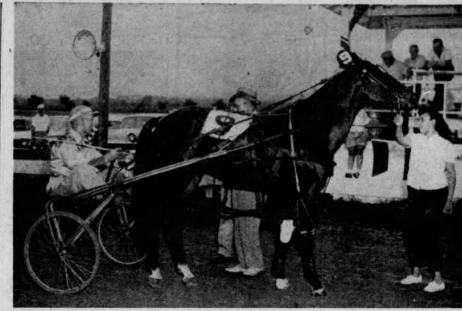
