Thursday Will Salute Youth Activities

With dry, cooler weather forecast for Wednesday exhibits at the 26th annual Ross County Fair were cleaning up debris blown about during Tuesday night's storm and anticipating a large turnout for Chillicothe Day.

The much-needed rain that hit here late Tuesday soaked in to the ground within an hour after the storm.

Junior Fair swine and dairy and dual purpose cattle were being judged Wednesday morning.

The grandstand attraction for Wednesday night is the 1964 annual horse show at 7 p.m.

Future Farmers of America demonstrations will be held at the same time in the Junior Fair Building.

The Southern High School and Chillicothe summer bands will provide Midway music.

Youth Activities Day: Girl Scouts will conduct flag ceremonies. Thursday, Youth Activities Day.

Highlighting the morning's activities will be the Junior Fair show judging at 9 a.m. by Howard Ritter of Washington, O.H.

Also at 9 a.m. will be open class judging of swine, dairy and dual purpose cattle.

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Vote Sought For Boost In Sales Tax

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Sponsors will be sought shortly for a petition to bring a state sales tax increase bill before the 1965 legislature.

A final decision on the oft-discussed proposal was reached Tuesday by the Ohio Council for Education, once a clearing of a house and now an action agency for legislative ideas of 10 over 10 education organizations.

The council's executive committee said increasing the state income tax from three to four per cent should produce \$80 million more marks annually.

Gov. James A. Rhodes has said earlier this month he would like to ask for no new or increased tax-stimulus from the legislature.

Proposed in the bill are a 4 per cent boost in the state, more money for guidance and research work, and a large amount to help crippled children.

Local districts would get \$25 million from the state for each year of the "naturally disadvantaged" program.
