Chillicothe Day Attendance At Fair Tops 7,000 Mark

Chillicothe held the place of honor on Thursday's county fair program, and it was really a hot time for the old town all day and night.

Undaunted by the steamy weather, all Chillicothe, it appeared, went to the fair. Official paid attendance was announced at 7,002, as compared with 4,981 last year. The figure does not include season tickets.

A fine swim start was made at 9 a. m. with the hog judging behind the cattle barns. Beef cattle were paraded before the judges at 1 p. m., and a program of music by the Adelphi band attracted many seat-seekers to the shade about the bandstand at 2.

Death Takes Former Pastor Of Trinity



Dr. S. W. Rosenberger, 77, pastor of the Trinity Methodist church from 1939 to 1942, when he was succeeded by the Rev. James H. Lyon, died Thursday at University hospital, Columbus.

He was retired from active ministry after 42 years of service and had been in failing health for the last few years.

Dr. Rosenberger, as pastor of the local church, succeeded the late Dr. Asa J. Kettle.

He was a native of Tiffin and was graduated from Heidelberg college in that city, from the Theological Seminary at Westminster, Md. He obtained his Doctor of Divinity degree at Adrian college, Adrian, Mich.

He served pastorates at Bayport, Mt. Vernon, Empire, Cambridge, Steubenville and churches at University avenue and Maryland avenue in Columbus before coming to this city.

Annually since 1918, he had served as a representative to the Methodist general conference was active as a delegate to the Methodist District conference and also served with the General and Jurisdictional conference in June of 1950.

Dr. Rosenberger served three terms as president of the Ohio Methodist Protestant conference, and had been a member of the National Executive Board of the Methodist church.

The Rosenbergs, who had many friends in this city, had two children, a son and daughter, both of whom are married.
