

4-H Boys, Girls Receive Trophies

Friday night fairgoers, left in the dark for more than an hour by the burning out of high tension wires, patiently bided their time until the current once again reached the grounds.

The return of electricity seemed to spark the fairground activities as the pulsing rhythm of the auctioneer's chant gathered speed at the Kiwanis 4-H steer club sales in the judging tent, and the signal was given for the show to go on at the grandstand, where Klein's Attractions had been in progress.

Attendance Drops

Fair fever apparently was dampened by the droopy day, as only 2,227 general admission tickets were sold at the gate. Last year's attendance record shows 3,355 entrants for the fourth day of the fair.

Don Ehrig, Republican gubernatorial candidate, spent three hours in his annual visit to the fair. Showing him the sights were Joe Clark, Ralph Wasley, J. W. Tucker, Albert Donahue and Thomas Ringer, members of the Ross county Republican executive committee.

Although the rains came during the second heat of the first harness race, all eight heats of the afternoon were run on schedule. Between-heat music was furnished by the Adelphi band, and a specialty act by Klein's Attractions took place before the final heat of the day.
