NEW YORK (AP)—James M.  
Latta, former dean of the Har  
vard Law School, pleaded guilty  
in federal court today to income  
tax charges.  
Latta, 41, who has held high

in 1961, had been charged with  
five counts of failure to file what  
were termed "timely" income tax  
returns for the years 1958 through  
1962.
