Work begins on 3 more city streets

A one-block section of Hickory Street will be torn up Monday, and will be open only to limited traffic until stabilization work is done and the street is repaved, according to Beverly Soaps, city service director.

Painting work will also get underway Monday on Water Street and on Market Street behind City Hall, Soaps said. The Market Street parking area will be closed while the work is being done.

Both projects are being done as part of the city street improvement program being done with federal revenue sharing funds.

The pavement on Hickory Street will be torn up, the road bed graded, compacted and treated and a new road surface and down between Second and Water Streets.

On Water and Market Streets, the pavement will not be torn up, but a new coat of surface sealant will be applied over the existing pavement. Some sealanting work is also underway in the Chillicothe Manor area.

The street work is being done under contract by Brewer and Brewer Sons Inc.

Firm studying development area

A considerable amount of preliminary work remains to be done before development plans are completed for the Schneider farm, west of the city.

John Deeth, landscape architect with Scholony, Christian Associates, a Columbus architectural, engineering and planning firm, said his studies, a soil study and a conference with the developers of the property are necessary before detailed work gets underway.

Deeth said his firm has involved examining the site to get ideas, identify slopes and natural amenities to be preserved, Deeth said.

The present work is "a very preliminary type study" on the potential of the site, he said. He said it would be several months before the nature of the development is determined and detailed plans are prepared.

Proposals under consideration for the area include single family and multi-family housing, condominiums and a shopping center and self storage.

The fruits of the marketing study and the city's needs will determine which are indicated, he said.

Other attractions include a gym, coin show and flea market daily in the downtown area.

A team might make two trips daily from Oak Hill to William. Daily free entertainment has been planned.
