**Tells Japan's Problem**  
He explained, "Japan has a bread-and-butter problem. She has tried both colonization and industrialization—but she lacks raw materials and must push out her trade lines. She has realized she must save the China markets. While we sympathize with Japan, we are sure she is engaged in a war that will work her undoing. The Japanese are eager now to draw in a western nation, so they can throw up their hands and blame their defeat on Russia."

Dr. Russell H. Bready, pastor of the Bainbridge M. E. church, spoke on "Nazism, Fascism, Communism or Christ?" in the evening.

"We conservatives must recognize that the capitalistic system is broken down. It recognizes the right of every man to accumulate all the wealth he can regardless of common human welfare. If conservatives seek longer to maintain this economic order, they will bring on revolution. When we have a revolution, we will have a dictator."

**Asks New Front**  
"I maintain that neither Fascism, Nazism or Communism can fit into the teachings of Jesus. If all our Americans will hasten to stand on the platform of The Sermon on the Mount, we will never have any of the ills infesting

Patty Smith of Creleville received the electric iron offered by Hughes of Williamsport.

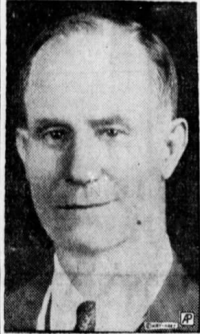

**L**EBANON, Tenn., (AP)—John Emmett Edgerton, who rose from a laborer in the tobacco fields of North Carolina to the presidency of the National Association of Manufacturers in the United States, died last night, aged 58.

He served as president of the National Association for 10 years before his resignation in 1931.

As president of the Southern States Industry Council, Edgerton was outspoken in his criticism of President Roosevelt's labor policies under the National Recovery administration.
