

## Third livestock sale at fair tonight

The last of three junior fair livestock sales will be held tonight, as the 31st Ross County Fair heads into its final hours.

Kevin Wayland, Frankfort, sold his grand champion lamb to Frankfort Supply in the junior fair lamb sale Thursday evening.

Joe Lane bought the 110-pound lamb for \$1.55 per pound. Wayland placed second in senior sheep showmanship.

The 115-pound reserve grand champion lamb, owned by Neil Swepton, was auctioned for \$1.35 per pound to Iron Horse Buildings, Circleville. Swepton, Route 2, Kingston, sold the other two of his pen of three to Landmark for 95 cents per pound. Swepton won senior sheep showmanship in judging Wednesday.

Laura Dawson, Route 6, sold her grand champion pen of two, weighing 250 pounds, to Union Stockyards, Hillsboro, for \$1 per pound.

The 190-pound reserve grand champion pen of two, owned by Don Hughes, Route 2, Frankfort, sold for \$1 per pound to First National Bank.

Deanna Steele, Route 1, Kingston, sold her 330-pound reserve grand champion pen of three to First National Bank for 95 cents per pound.

A 95-pound lamb owned by Cindy Eselgroth netted \$485 for the 4-H Building Fund. Oakley C. Collins bought the lamb for 91 cents per pound and donated it for the building fund. After spirited bidding, Taylor's Used Cars, near Greenfield,

bought the lamb for \$5 per pound.

Tracy Crabtree, Crabtree Farms, will sell her grand champion beef animal tonight in the junior fair steer sale.

The 1,060-pound Simmental Hereford cross was announced champion in judging Thursday.

The reserve grand champion steer is owned by Don Clever, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Clever, Route 2, Kingston.

Teresa Roll's 225-pound hog placed first in junior fair pork evaluation. Other winners in order are Andy Roll, Angela Putnam, Randy Putnam, Marty Putnam and Barbara Wood.

Kelvin Putnam's 210-pound hog won the open class pork evaluation. Other winners in order are R. L. Anderson, Debbie Roll, Mrs. Wallace Putnam, Willard Wood and Keith Putnam.

The carcass swine were judged Monday and taken to Columbus to be slaughtered, cut and evaluated.

Lovell Butcher, Route 6, won Class C horseshoe competition Thursday.

Attendance Thursday at the fair totaled \$5,497 to put statistics for this year higher than 1974. Officials attributed the large attendance to the beautiful weather and the tractor pull in the evening.
