## PLANS RUSHED FOR 'BIGGEST AND BEST' FAIR

### Big Crowds Expected To Attend 4-Day Program At Fairgrounds

Gates will swing open at 12 noon Wednesday for the four-day Pickaway County Fair and the big agricultural exposition will be under way and will continue through Saturday.

Last-minute preparations were being made, Tuesday, to handle tremendous throngs of Fair visitors and officials of the Pickaway County Agricultural Society said that they expect the first full-fledged County Fair in Circleville since 1898 to prove a great success.

The admission will be 40 cents for all persons over the age of 12 years and children under 12 will be admitted free. All indications point to record-breaking crowds during the four thrill-packed days of the Fair.

Preceding the formal opening of the Fair at noon Wednesday all market animals will be weighed in between 7 and 10:30 a. m. Wednesday at the livestock auction sales.

At 2 p. m., there will be a demonstration contest showing achievements of 4-H club girls.

At 8 p. m., the Saddle Horse Show will be held at the grandstand with music supplied by the Adelphi Band. Admission will be 50 cents.

Fireworks display at 10:30 p. m. will close the first day's Fair program.

During the next three days of the County Fair the gates will be opened each day at 7 a. m.

## POWER STRIKE ENDS QUICKLY AT PITTSBURGH

### AFL Seaman Boycott Wage Board Meeting; CIO To Make Demands Later

A crippling power strike was called off almost as soon as it began today, but there appeared little hope for peace on the nation's waterfronts, where about 3,000 ships remained tied up in the greatest maritime walkout in history.

Half an hour after the 12:01 a. m. power strike deadline, union president George L. Mueller acceded to an injunction issued against the company and union to prevent a strike in the Pittsburgh industrial area.

Mueller said he had recommended suspension of strike action until after a court hearing on the injunction Friday, but emphasized that only the rank-and-file of the union had the power to call off the strike permanently.

Meanwhile, at Washington, striking AFL maritime unions today boycotted a wage stabilization board hearing aimed at finding a solution to the worst shipping strike in the nation's history.

The boycott was voted by the strike strategy committee of the Seafarer's International Union and the Sailors Union of the Pacific at a New York meeting as the effects of the six-day walkout spread rapidly to other sections of the nation's economy.

The board, however, went ahead with the hearing—the first conference since the strike began.

## Retail Meat Ceilings In Effect; Supply Short

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 10—Retail meat prices today, back under OPA ceilings today, and housewives were told that gloomy predictions of a grave new meat famine may well be "overly pessimistic."**

OPA's new ceilings reduced meat prices from their recent levels, but averaged 3-4 cents a pound higher than the ceilings on June 30, when controls lapsed.

The 3-4 cent increase means housewives will pay about \$600,000,000 more for meat a year than under June 30 prices.

A total of 267 cuts of beef, pork, lamb and mutton were covered by the new price ceilings. OPA has taken no action yet on putting new ceilings on meat dishes served by restaurants.

Many butcher shops greeted the first day of the new ceilings with little meat on their counters. It was the result of heavy buying by housewives in anticipation of dwindling supplies with the return of price control.
