ASC Committeemen In Hi-Co Elected

Farmers of Highland County have elected a total of 85 ASC community committeemen and alternates in a mail election conducted earlier this month, according to Harry W. Shaw, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

In Madison Township, David Winegar, was elected chairman; Dean Simmons, vice-chairman; Albert Johnson, member; Kenneth Baldwin, first alternate and Richard Unger Sr., second alternate.

ASC community committees assist the county ASC committee in administering farm programs in Highland County, such as wheat and tobacco acreage allotments, feed grain bases and agricultural conservation cost-sharing measures. They also help keep local producers informed of farm program provisions and regulations.

In addition, the just-elected ASC community committees have an important responsibility in the near future in filling vacancies on the county ASC committee and determining the chairman and vice-chairman for the coming year, Shaw said.

The new ASC community committee will convene Sept. 21 at 1 p.m. in the South Central Power meeting room in Hillsboro.
