

## Pizza king to be honored at Jackson Apple Festival

Apples and pizza share the spotlight at the 43rd annual Jackson County Apple Festival, which continues through Saturday in Jackson. Not only does the event celebrate a bumper crop of apples from seven orchards, this year it will honor Jeno F. Paulucci, founder of Jeno's Inc. The industry has two plants in Jackson County and employs about 1,000 persons.

Paulucci will arrive at the festival at 10 a.m. Friday via Jeno's Air Shuttle. At that time, Gov. James A. Rhodes will confer on Paulucci "The Elite Commodore of Ohio" award.

Both men will be present at the Wellston plant site Friday noon when Paulucci dedicates both plants. Also present for this grand opening will be James Duerk, director of Ohio Economic and Community Development, Glenn Allen, executive director of the Ohio Commodores, and W.T. Blair, president of the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. Following the dedication ceremony, free pizza rolls and refreshments will be available to the public until 3 p.m. Free hot air balloon rides and a balloon derby launch also will be featured.

Throughout the festival, visitors may partake of many apple products, see apple butter being made, and attend flea markets and craft, quilt and art shows.

Saturday the Apple Festival winds to a close with the Grand Finale Parade which begins at 1 p.m. This parade is billed as the "largest lighted parade in Ohio" and entry is by invitation only.

The Last Party on Paoli will be held Friday in front of the Courthouse. As usual, sandwiches and beverages will be offered at the 10:15-7:45 p.m. event. Entertainment for this last flay of the season will be provided by "Roscoe."

## What's happening

Drill team competition will be Oct. 17, beginning at 11 a.m. in front of the reviewing stand. Three places will be given in the categories of marching and precision, appearance and uniforms, and Best of Show.

Judging for float entries in the Oct. 17 parade will be 1 p.m. Three Best of Parade placings will be awarded in the categories of religious, commercial and organization.

Horse units participating in the parade will be judged at 1:30 p.m., with prizes going to the best individual rider, best group, and best team or teams of horses. Scooper service must be provided for all animal entries and animals must be clean and well groomed. The rider or driver is required to be costumed or in Western attire and the entry, whether it is to be judged or not, will not be allowed to participate in the parade unless clothing requirements are met.

Following the judging, the grand parade will begin at 2 p.m. Positions in the parade lineup will be made as applications are received and positions will be announced when participants arrive at the festival. Fee judging purposes, parade participants must be in place by 1 p.m.

Other general rules set by the festival committee and concerning the parade are included with parade applications, available by contacting Alice Alexander, parade chairman, Fall Festival of Leaves, P.O. Box 571, Bamberley, OH 43011. Parade entries are due by Oct. 7.

## A celebration of autumn

In recognition of the season, Laurelville residents are hosting the seventh annual Hocking Valley Autumn Festival Saturday. Available to visitors will be soap and apple cider making, homemade baked goods, ice cream and arts and crafts, games for the children, garden produce, horseshoes, and a county costume contest.

Featured is the 12:30 p.m. open fun horse show, with 4-H rules applying. Points will be kept on performance and content classes, with high-point individuals, ages 19 or under, receiving special recognition. Performance classes will be offered in: Pony Horsemanship, 96-inch and under ponies; Horse Horsemanship, ages 13 and under, and 14-19; Trail Class, horse and pony; Bareback Pleasure; Pony Pleasure, 66-inch and under ponies; and Horse Pleasure, ages 14-19, 13 and under.

Content classes are: Barrel Race; Flag Race; Dash for Cash; and State Band.

Other classes offered will be: Lead-In, for riders 6 and under; Walk and Trot, ages 8 and under; Baby Bottle; Adult Horsemanship, ages 19 and over; Costume Class; Egg and Spoon; and Adult Pleasure, ages 19 and over. A final Non-Winners Class will be held for those not receiving a first or second place at the show.

Key "Tracy" Davis will judge the show. A \$2 entry fee will be charged, as well as a \$1 gate donation per vehicle. A trophy and five place ribbons will be awarded in each class.

The Hocking Valley Autumn Festival begins at 10 a.m. and all activities will be held at the Laurelville Church of God. A rain date has been set for Oct. 1.
