Democrats Expecting Big Crowd At Courthouse To Hear Candidate

SOLON'S VOTE ATTACKED

Bricker Pledges No New Taxes As He Talks In Chillicothe

Martin L. Davey, Democratic candidate for governor, will speak at the Court House plaza, Circleville, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Carl Leist, Pickaway County Democratic chairman, stated Thursday that he had not yet been definitely informed who would be with Davey Saturday, but said he was sure it would be either John McSweeney, Democratic candidate for United States senator, who has been traveling with Davey, Dennis Dunlavy, Democratic candidate for Supreme Court Judge, or William Kennedy, unsuccessful Democratic candidate for governor in the primary election.

Davey will speak from the Court House steps unless it rains, in which case the program will take place in Memorial Hall. Chairman Leist said that loud speakers would be installed so that everyone in the crowd might hear the speakers. The Davey party will come to Circleville from Washington C. H. and will probably go from here to Chillicothe.

Ray W. Davis, Circleville, Republican nominee for congress from the 11th Ohio district, told a Chillicothe audience Wednesday evening that he would welcome the opportunity to debate issues in the present campaign with Harold K. Claypool, Chillicothe incumbent, who is his opponent for the office.

Davis appeared on the same program with Governor John W. Bricker, who promised no new taxes for Ohio under his tenure of office. Tom A. Renick, state central committeeman for the 11th district, introduced the governor.

Davis said his opponent voted consistently for administration measures except on one question, the Hatch Act. No other Ohio representative, Republican or Democrat, voted against it, he declared. "I believe he owes the 11th district an apology for putting it on record against clean politics," Davis declared.
