## HONOR SCHOLARS AT TRINITY ARE GIVEN ANNUAL BANQUET

A plea for a greater Sunday school, that was the keynote of the talks made following the dinner given at Trinity M. E. church last evening, by Mr. John P. Phillips, superintendent of the Trinity Sunday school, in honor of the scholars who were present at Sunday school thirty-nine Sundays during 1925. In a short talk which he made, Mr. Phillips expressed the hope that in the years to come, Trinity would have an even greater Sunday school and that there will be one hundred honor scholars at these banquets. Next year's banquet, he announced, will be held on September 28, 1926, next Sunday being counted as the first Sunday in the new year.

The honor guests and others, arrived at the church at six o'clock, last evening, and were seated at long tables prettily decorated with strips of pink crepe paper, with a profusion of fall flowers and lighted pink candles, while other flowers decorated the Sunday school room. Overhead, were fastened streamers of pink crepe paper.

A most delicious dinner was served by a number of the women of the church, the menu consisting of fried chicken, sweet potatoes, creamed peas, salad, hot rolls, jelly, ice cream, cake and coffee.

During the evening, splendid music was furnished by the Trinity Sunday school orchestra, under the direction of William L. Huff, and the Trinity Junior church orchestra, whose members have been most ably directed by Mrs. Eleanor Huff.

Dr. G. M. Phillips acted as chairman of the program and first introduced the visitors and honor guests, who, this year, numbered fifty-six. Rev. A. P. Cherrington, the retiring district superintendent, gave a short talk, expressing regret on the part of Mrs. Cherrington and himself at their departure from this city and extending greetings to the new district superintendent, Rev. J. W. Blair, who was also a guest at the dinner. Rev. Blair then spoke, stating that he would do all in his power to carry on his work in the best possible way, and said: "I believe the Protestant churches must put on a broad and extensive religious education program in the next fifty years, and it will come as an absolute necessity."

"The Obligation of a Great Sunday school" was the subject of a brief talk by Rev. A. B. Riker, who said: "Every teacher should consider it a matter of pride to be able to teach and to develop a real knowledge of the Scriptures. I should like to see this Sunday school result to a great evangelism." He advocated having a teacher training class in the Sunday school that the teachers may be better equipped for their work and also spoke of the need of a teachers' library.
