### Organizers hope to move Indian festival next year . . .

**HALLSVILLE** — If Robert Anderson's dreams are realized, tonight's Indian Summer Festival will be the last held on Marietta Road at the south edge of Hallsville.

Anderson, president of the Hallsville Community Center Inc., said the organization's goal is to move the festival to the town park at the east end of town next fall.

The Indian Summer Festival makes its ninth appearance tonight and will continue with entertainment, food and other activities through Sunday.

Proceeds from the festival are used to raise money for the park. "This year we hope to have a concrete pad down to put a community shelter on it," said Anderson.

**PLANS CALL** for constructing a 1,600-square-foot shelterhouse, containing a kitchen and, eventually, restrooms at the park.

Already the park has eight teeter-totters and a baseball diamond. When members of the group have time, they plan to erect a merry-go-round, jungle jim and sliding boards that have been purchased for the 6.4-acre park.

"I'd like to get down there" next year, Anderson said. "We turn a cow pasture into a festival ground every year."

But the immediate attention is focused on tonight's activity. The Indian Princess Parade will be held at 6. Opening ceremonies and flag raising will follow and Indian Princess Erin Hutchinson will crown another girl to reign over the 1983 festivities.

Friday's highlights are the Little Indian Princess Parade and contest at 6 p.m. and square dancing with C & R Express at 8.

**SATURDAY** features a full day of activities ranging from a walk-a-thon at 9:30 a.m. to fireworks at 10:30 p.m.

Sunday's program begins with a sunrise breakfast at 9 a.m. and ends with a square dance show at 2 p.m.

The festival grounds will open at 5:45 p.m. Thursday and Friday. A flea market will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday and the Indian Summer Horse Show is set for Sunday at noon.

The horsethrow will feature 19 classes or contests, using electric timing, with entry fees of \$3 to \$5 per class. Cash prizes will be awarded. Lee Tracy is judge.

The festival also has arts and crafts and old-fashioned games and entertainment. There will be a hog roast, and other refreshments will be available.
