

# Retired Centralia school head dies

Arthur L. Hinton, 72, former superintendent of the Centralia School District, died at 1:30 a.m., today, at his Route 2, Laurelville, home.

Dr. Robert H. McCoy, Circleville, said Hinton died of a heart attack.

Hinton served the Ross County School District for 48 years. He was superintendent of the Centralia District for five years, a teacher in the district for 37 years and a teacher at the Bullcreek School for one year.

Hinton was a member of the Hocking County Library Board, and of the Board of Directors of the Salt Creek Valley Bank. He served 20 years as Sunday School superintendent, was chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Laurelville Trinity United Methodist Church, a 50-year member of the Adelphi Aladdin Temple Band and a member of Adelphi Masonic Lodge No. 527. He was a graduate of Salt Creek High School and Ohio University in 1933. He was born April 15, 1902.

Service for Hinton will be 2 p.m., Tuesday, at the Laurelville United Methodist Church, with the Rev. Jacob Lehman officiating. Burial will follow in Green Summit Cemetery, Adelphi.

# Greenfield man found dead in field

A Greenfield man, who has been reported missing about a month, was found dead about a mile from his home 7:30 p.m., Friday.

Greenfield Police said that Everett W. Gaul, 77, of Lyndon Ave., Greenfield, was found by hunters in a field, a mile south of Greenfield. Police said Gaul had been missing for a month or a month and one-half. The Highland County Sheriff's Department had been notified of his disappearance on Oct. 3.

Greenfield Police said that they had made "several" searches for the man, even in that field and apparently "just missed him. No foul play is suspected," said Highland County Coroner Dr. Paul W. Terrell. Although no official report has been filed, Dr. Terrell said that he would probably rule that Gaul died of natural causes on the same day as his disappearance.

Service for Gaul will be 2 p.m., Monday, at the Murphysboro Funeral Home, Greenfield, with the Rev. Robert K. Blum officiating. Burial will follow at Greenfield Cemetery.

Friends may call at the funeral home after noon Sunday.

Gaul is survived by his widow, Flora Burns Gaul, whom he married in 1916; a sister, Mrs. Mae H. Gaul, Greenfield.

He was predeceased by his parents, John and Mary Burnett Gaul; four brothers and three sisters.
