

A. WHY RESEARCH WILLIAM LOCKWOOD HUFF (1875-1942)?

I have been fortunate to have had opportunities to play in a number of different types of bands over several decades.

Good times. Good friends. Good music.

In fact, one of these bands local to Chillicothe, Ohio is the Adelphi (Ohio) Community Band.

Adelphi, Ohio is a small town of approximately 400 people, and sits in the northeast corner of Ross County. This band claims a start date of 1880 and plays almost exclusively marches, waltzes, and serenades that were written primarily from 1880-1930.

And many of these were written by William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942).

As a bonus, The Adelphi Community Band also claims Will Huff as a past member and past Director.

What happened often in that band in years past, and continues to some extent even today, is that it was common during down time in the performances for us younger musicians to hear stories from the older band members about musicians, friends, and events long since passed.

These stories included Will Huff and several of his compositions.....some of which became regulars on concert lists for the band even to this day....and even one or two songs of his that maybe hadn't totally caught the fancy of all of the band members at that time.

Regardless, the path for this project about Will Huff was further paved by the fact that my personal library includes several excellent biographies of other march composers.

I can verify that my copies of these books continue to be well used, contain many sticky notes used as page tabs for the sections I find I want to frequently reference, sometimes have illegible hand written notes in pencil in the margins, and they all show multiple underlined and highlighted sections throughout.

And, truth be told, I have probably been both the <u>cause</u> of, as well as the <u>target</u> of, more than my share of eye rolling from my beautiful bride, select family members, and those band friends who happened to be around me at any given time when I thought that I had found another trivia gem from the lives of these composers that I felt everyone else would benefit from if only I shared it with them.

I am thankful that they have thus far been fairly tolerant.

So, with the privilege of retirement and the much appreciated ability to now spend an increased amount of time on those things that truly interest me, I realized that I wanted to know more about the march composer who was practically born in my backyard and who spent much of his life in and around Chillicothe.

And I am glad I did.

This has been a journey probably unlike any other I have ever taken, and I am glad I finally took that first step.

So, why don't you pull up a comfortable chair, grab a drink (adult beverage or otherwise), set aside 5-6 hours or so of your time, and you are welcome to explore these several hundred pages of trivia gems from the lives of William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) and his family that I feel everyone would benefit from if only I shared this information with them.

B. PREVIOUS RESEARCH ON WILL HUFF

Mr Paul Bierley from Ohio, author of the 1982 definitive biography on Henry Fillmore of Cincinnati, Ohio titled "Hallelujah Trombone! The Story of Henry Fillmore", included a short discussion in that book about Mr. William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) of Chillicothe, Ohio.

Mr. Bierley also added information about Will Huff in his accompanying book, "The Music of Henry Fillmore and Will Huff". That book was also published in 1982.

Mr. Bierley has published several books on John Philip Sousa and at least a couple on Henry Fillmore. All of these books by Mr. Bierley are excellent references, and the Reader is encouraged to check all of them out whenever possible.

I have read my copies of them multiple times....and they all have my own sticky note page tabs for the sections I find I want to frequently reference.... my personal (and sometimes illegible) pencil notes in the margins.... and all have multiple underlined and highlighted pages throughout.

Mr. Bierley was an excellent and detailed researcher, and because of the year he started that part of his research involving Will Huff, he was able to meet with 3 of the remaining Huff children who still resided in Chillicothe at that time.

However, since the topic of his book was Henry Fillmore, his inclusion of Will Huff was done almost exclusively just to deal briefly with how the two composers overlapped in their lives and careers and the almost unbelievable way that they became connected.

Naturally, there was considerable information left out of even Mr. Bierley's books regarding the life and times of Chillicothe's Mr. Will Huff.

Aside from Mr. Bierley's work, all other references found on Will Huff during the course of this project were all extremely brief and of questionable reliability.

This Narrative on William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) is an attempt to try to fill in at least some of the gaps left unaddressed by any prior researchers.

C. MUSIC WAS A FAMILY AFFAIR

After conducting the research on which this Narrative is based, it was obvious that Mr. Huff's life was much more than just being a solitary name on the upper right corner of a march sitting on my music stand.

But, in addition to the obvious accomplishments by the Will Huff family from sharing their musical talents with their churches and the community, they unfortunately also suffered some almost unbelievable tragedies.

These would include the untimely deaths of two of his sons.

One son was on stage playing in a military band with Bob Hope in Africa at the time of an horrific event. And another son was just standing outside of his home in Indianapolis, Indiana when tragedy struck.

But several other facts also seemed to stand out as a result of this research.

Will Huff and his entire family made numerous contributions to the world of music in general and to the lives of the citizens in Ross County, Ohio in particular. These certainly included his musical compositions, musical arrangements, and countless concerts in the park and throughout the area. But also important was the family's life-long support of, and participation in, musical organizations, public performances, church activities, and numerous civic and social groups.

In "Chapter 19 Bands Started or Conducted", the Reader will find a list of all the bands mentioned in these articles that Will Huff founded, or directed, or both. Many of the sources found during this research have hinted that this number of bands should actually be much larger due to Mr. Huff's apparent extensive travels for several years.

However, the only bands mentioned in this Narrative are the ones found in the research sources used for this project.

In "Chapter 18 Songs Composed or Arranged by Will Huff in These Articles", the Reader will find a listing of the Will Huff compositions and arrangements mentioned in these sources.

As stated in other sections of this Narrative, many of these compositions were about specific events, places, or groups in and around Chillicothe.

More on that topic later.

But one facet of the lives of the Huff family I did not necessarily expect to find was the intense and lasting association of the Huff family with the area churches. This was evidenced by the strength of

their connections as a family to the churches, to service to their community, and to their faith.

In fact, the Reader will frequently find that at several events, to include church services and other types of gatherings, Will Huff may be found on the program directing an orchestra or band. Then, often Mrs. Will Huff would follow directing a different orchestra or band, or even a choir at the same event.

Plus, in one or more of these events, one or more of their children might be participating as instrumental musicians.....or as vocalists....or as Directors of other musical groups.....or even as actors in whatever play or musical that was associated with that music and the event.

As a result of this information, I decided to expand the scope of this Narrative to include not only William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942), but also the members of his immediate family....and maybe a little beyond.

For the William Lockwood Huff family, music was truly a family affair!

D. WILL HUFF COMPOSITIONS AND HIS PROMOTION OF CHILLICOTHE

Many sources consider Will Huff to have completed @ 90 to 100 compositions. Even his obituary credits him with having composed nearly 100 marches.

And interestingly, "Will Huff" was always how he listed his name on all of his compositions that I have found. I never found that he ever used his full name.

One very detailed researcher was only able to officially catalog @ 66 of Will Huff's compositions.

Other attempts by other authors don't come even <u>that</u> close to identifying the correct number of Mr. Huff's compositions.

Once the Reader gets into at least scanning through these articles, it will be easy to see why there is such confusion.

Huff is credited in these articles with writing many specialty numbers which were dedicated to Chillicothe, various events around Chillicothe, and even to local social and civic groups. However, the Reader will be hard pressed to find many of these songs in any serious attempts made by others to produce a complete list of Will Huff's compositions.

In fact, of the list of @ 71 Will Huff compositions and arrangements found in these articles, @ 17 were clearly written specifically about Chillicothe groups, places, or events!

Most of these these works will be easy to spot by their titles among the list of songs found during this research.

2. By far, the bulk of the information contained in this Narrative came from newspapers.com

If you are <u>not</u> familiar with this website, it is an excellent resource for information.

However, the list of both the benefits, as well as the drawbacks, in using this as a research tool would probably make this Narrative twice as long.

But for ALL of its negatives, using newspapers.com is still better than having to read every word from every publication in order to find what you are after.

3. Interviews were NOT attempted with any remaining family members.

This was because:

- a) By the time of this writing, William Lockwood Huff would have been @ 145 years old.
- b) At this point, his children have all passed by a couple decades or more.
- c) Even some of Will Huff's known grandchildren are deceased by now, possibly leaving any remaining descendants left to potentially interview, if they could even be located, coming in at no closer than the "great" grandchild level.
- d) I wasn't on the hunt to try to find any hidden treasures in the forms of original manuscripts, forgotten personal diaries, or other papers now squirreled safely

away, or even just forgotten, in attics or basements.

- e) This Narrative wasn't meant to be that kind of product, anyway. Someone else is certainly welcome to try to take up that banner for a more differently researched product if so desired.
- 4. So as to NOT make this a life-long project that could never be finished, my searches through the records of Newspapers.com included several restrictions.
 - a). My newspaper sources and time frames were primarily focused on:
 - Chillicothe (Ohio) Gazette
 - Circleville (Ohio) Herald

Will Huff, by many accounts, stayed in many states and in many different cities in Ohio.

However, without obtaining any reliable list of dates for when he stayed in cities other than Chillicothe, trying to do a search of any of the local newspaper archives for those areas wasn't going to be a productive use of time.

b). My searches were almost always done only looking for the word "Huff".

This still wound up being a harvest of @ 950 newspaper articles...PLUS websites...PLUS other written sources

And here we go......

1. This isn't a book, a thesis, or a dissertation.

But, to be honest, I don't know what this is.

It was just originally meant to be a vehicle to document, at least for <u>my</u> personal enjoyment as well as the same for a couple of friends who showed an early interest in this project, what information I could find about William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) and his immediate family from searching the local newspapers.....as well as from a few scattered web sites and other sources along the way.

And then to be able to cohesively share these discoveries at some point with anyone outside of this initial group who might feel similar interests.

So, in order to just eliminate the angst of trying to figure out some fancy way to label this different kind of project, I have chosen to just call this a "Narrative"

2. Are there errors and omissions?

Absolutely.....well....at least probably.....

At one point in the birth of this Narrative, it was over 11,000 paragraphs, over 91,000 words, and over 528,000 characters.

Yep...probably a few mistakes sprinkled in there for good measure....just to keep me humble.

4. This Narrative is meant to be purely devoid of my personal opinions about the Huff family and Will Huff's music.

I had absolutely <u>no</u> agenda in doing all this work other than to personally learn more about a local composer whose music I have played and appreciated for decades.

5. With this unexpectedly large number of newspaper articles found, as well as the other sources that were used in creating this Narrative, I thought at first that I would only pull from each source the specific mentions of Will Huff.

However, once I got deeper into reviewing all this information, I realized that this just wasn't going to do.

Many of these articles also contained fascinating information about the history of the Chillicothe area, which included:

- The several times that Will Huff and the IOOF Band, along with several Chillicothe dignitaries, traveled to Columbus to present the positives about the Chillicothe area across the radio air waves from OSU radio.
- Huff's participation in the opening of the brand new Chillicothe High School.
- Huff's role in the opening of Mt. Logan school (Chillicothe, Ohio).
- Huff's efforts in the creation of what was apparently the first church band in the state, if not in several states.
- Huff's opinion when he was asked about the plans to finally add a music program, to specifically include an instrumental program, into the Chillicothe High School.
- The programs found of the numerous band concerts given in the "City Park" where Will Huff either directed the band or where any number of his compositions were included in the concert programs.
- The impressive roles that Will Huff, his wife, and <u>all</u> his children played in the musical activities of the Chillicothe area and their commitment of service to others through their church and civic efforts.

So, my compromise for the Narrative was to try to provide enough of a summary of each article in order to better explain the involvement of the Huffs in it.

I would then place in that summary a link back to the original article.

The thought was that this would hopefully tease the Reader into clicking on the link back to the original article in order to read more about that specific entry.

The other side of the coin is that, for all of what this report ISN'T, it is still interesting to me as to what it IS.

- This Narrative contains printed notations on the Huff family timeline stretching from 1844 to 2020. That makes this Narrative an almost 180 year long chronicle of the life and times of William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) and his family as documented by local newspapers and several other sources.
- While my prime focus was on the years 1900-1952, the other information found beyond those dates was included since it better fleshed out a more complete story of the Huff family.

But the bottom line about this narrative about William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) and his family is that:

"It is what it is!"

But wait, there's MORE.

As you have have already found:

One of the first things to get out of the way is the necessity to deal with the fascinating story of how William Lockwood Huff, a music composer from Chillicothe, became involved with Henry Fillmore, an internationally known music composer.

Henry Fillmore was a composer and music arranger from Cincinnati, and published initially through his father's music publishing business there.

For many reasons, Fillmore wrote music under several names, one of which happened to be "Will Huff".

Fillmore later stated that he did not realize at the time that there already was a composer named "Will Huff" in Chillicothe, Ohio who was also writing and publishing marches.

Stories vary as to how Fillmore finally discovered that there was already someone with the REAL name of Will Huff composing music, but they eventually communicated with each other and Fillmore convinced Will Huff to come and publish with the Fillmore company.

The story is told from many sources that Will Huff was then given a contract by Fillmore to write marches for a march book, and that Huff finished this contract.

Supposedly, Will Huff was then given a contract by Fillmore to write marches for a second march book. Huff then completed some of the marches, but not enough to complete the book.

Henry Fillmore, however, went ahead and wrote the remaining songs in order to finish out the second march book and published them all under Will Huff's name.

No source was found during the course of this research that could affirmatively claim that Henry Fillmore <u>ever</u> revealed to anyone <u>exactly</u> which songs for this second book that he wrote under Will Huff's name, and which ones Will Huff actually wrote.

Regardless, there is a body of work under the name "Will Huff" and published by the Fillmore Publishing Company that apparently no one disputes was actually written by Will Huff.

Of course, this is in addition to compositions written by Huff and published by <u>other</u> companies both before AND after he moved over to the Fillmore Company.

Through the years, there have been numerous, and doubtless well-meaning, attempts by scholars and musicians to try to unravel this mystery as to who wrote what songs.

At least one person went so far as to claim outright success and boldly proclaimed that he had solved the mystery on this point once and for all, and that there should be no other questions on this matter.

With respect to anyone wanting to make that claim, unscrupulous painters have been fooling skilled art world "experts" for years by mimicking the painting styles and materials of paintings done by recognized masters of decades to centuries ago.

Accordingly, with all due respect to people wanting to claim to have "solved" this mystery between Huff and Fillmore, it is felt that they are letting their exuberance override their expected impartiality as a researcher.

At best, all they have are their <u>opinions</u> about the facts, especially since they all openly admit that they do not have the facts themselves.

Since both Huff and Fillmore have passed, and they were apparently the only ones found to date who ever knew the detailed truth of this matter, it is best to just let this mystery continue.

But, for those who, like me, having heard this story many times and who automatically assumed that Will Huff's composing career ended with the incomplete Fillmore books, that apparently wasn't true.

Huff's career as a composer can be separated roughly into five periods.

In the first period, from 1899-1908, he published with the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company.

The next period, beginning in 1908, and by far the most important, was when he was associated with the Fillmore Brothers Company.

For reasons not fully understood, he broke away from Fillmore, and beginning in 1915, published with Will H. Smith of Dixon, Illinois.

During the late 1920s, his music was published by the Star Music Company of Eldred, Pennsylvania. Thereafter, his music went unpublished.

He composed very little during the last decade of his life. He was content to perform occasionally with various bands in southern Ohio, making music with the many musician friends who thought so highly of him.

Will anyone who ISN'T named Will Huff, please stand up?

This was a very difficult research project.

The Reader might have already noticed that pretty much every time I have referenced Will Huff, the Composer who I wanted to make as the subject for this Narrative, I have often used the complete phrase:

"William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942)"

There are multiple reasons for this, and I have tried to illustrate at least some of them in the chart below.

If all these newspaper articles are to be believed, it seems like pretty much a least one male in each of several family generations of the Huff family was named "William Huff".

Sometimes the articles were complete enough to state that the person's full name was "William Lockwood Huff".

Interestingly, however, the name Will Huff was <u>not</u> always assigned to the <u>first</u> male child as is similar to what apparently happens in some European traditions. .

In fact, in the case of William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942), his child named William Huff Jr. (1916-1984) was actually the 4th of his 4 boys, and he was the 5th of of 6 children.

As a further complication in doing this research, following the trail of the newspaper articles finds that:

- William Lockwood Huff Sr. (1875-1942) passes away,
- Now the person previously identified as William Lockwood Huff <u>Jr</u>. (1916-1984) becomes a Sr, and
- His son *(the Grandson of William Lockwood Huff 1875-1942)* is now referenced as William Huff **Jr** *(1939-2006)*.

And so on.

Maybe the following chart will make this easier to follow.

THIS Will Huff was that he apparently was a Senior in high school in 1984

Since my focus on the Huff family was primarily through the years 1900-1952, anything that I found outside of those parameters was considered extra.

Accordingly, I purposely did <u>not</u> research further in either direction to see if the "Will Huff" naming pattern extended either <u>prior</u> to Thomas Huff, or <u>beyond</u> the Great Grandson level.

And then, of course, every "Will Huff" who got married would than have a spouse named "Mrs Will Huff"!

And the irony to this story is that I couldn't find anyone named "Will Huff", or any similar variation, in the March 2020 edition of the "Chillicothe, Ohio Area Telephone Directory".

A. FATHER TO WILLIAM LOCKWOOD HUFF

Thomas Huff

Born: May 24, 1844 in Coshocton, Ohio

Died: July 1922 at his home in Massieville. Death due to heart trouble.

The newspaper article from the Chillicothe Gazette announcing his death is dated July 24, 1922 and stated that he passed away on Monday.

The 1922 obituary for Thomas Huff lists as brothers:

- Theodore Huff, of California
- William Huff, of South Salem
- Charles Huff, of Salt Lake, Idaho
- Henry Huff, current residence unknown but listed in the obituary as surviving Thomas Huff.

No sisters were listed in Thomas Huff's obituary.

According to the source below:

- Thomas Huff married Mary Rutherford Huff on September 26, 1865
- Mary Rutherford Huff passed away in July 1885.
- Thomas Huff then married Helen Stinson Lockwood in 1890

This information would appear to be supported by the obituary for Thomas Huff which stated that he was married to Helen Huff at the time of his death in 1922.

This would also appear to be supported by the 1942 obituary of William Lockwood Huff which stated that his mother was Mary Rutherford Huff.

On the other side, much of the information in this reference material about Thomas Huff and the Huff family seems to be right on the money from the other information that was found during this research.

Regardless, this information should help the Reader to get a better idea of what was happening in Chillicothe, and to the Huff family, at this time.

The presentation here is admittedly cosmetically awkward for how I was able to capture sections of this information for placement in this narrative.

HISTORY OF ROSS COUNTY

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Thomas Huff is an old-time business man and professional photographer of Ross County and is now living quietly retired at his home in Massieville. He and the members of his family connection have been closely identified with Scioto Township and other sections of Ross County, and this is one of the honored names that requires something more than passing mention in a history of Ross County.

Mr. Huff was born in Huntington Township of this county May 24, 1844. His grandparents were pioneer settlers in Muskingum County, Ohio, where his father, Henry Huff, was born, at the Town of Zanesville. Henry learned the trade of cooper as a young man, and followed it at Zanesville. He died at Cowensville, Ohio, in 1852. Henry Huff married Barbara Ann Selby. She was born in Huntington Township of Ross County, a daughter of William Selby, who was born in Anne Arundel County, Maryland, and came to Ross County among the early settlers of Huntington Township. There he hewed a farm out of the woods. He served in the War of 1812 and was in every sense a patriotic and useful citizen. William Selby married Eva Grim, and both of them died when quite old.

At the death of her husband Mrs. Henry Huff was left a widow with seven children, whose names were William, John, Thomas, Charles, Theodore, Lewis and Henry.

Thomas Huff was eight years old when his father died. He soon had to shift for himself, and for some years he lived in the family of William Lockwood, a well-known old-time merchant at Massieville. While there he attended public schools and also clerked in the store of Mr. Lockwood.

Mr. Huff has an honorable record of participation in the Civil war. He first enlisted in May, 1862, in Company K of the Eighty-eighth Ohio Infantry. His term of service was for three months, and was principally spent on duty at Camp Chase, where at the time a great many Confederate prisoners were confined. Discharged at the end of three months, he returned home, but in the following year, June 29, 1863, enlisted in Company F of the Eighty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry. This time his enlistment was for six months. With his regiment he went south to Tennessee, and arrived at Cumberland Gap in time to witness the surrender of the Confederates who had held that position.

He was with his regiment until some weeks after his term expired, receiving his discharge February 12, 1864. Again he spent a few weeks receiving his discharge February 12, 1864. Again he spent a few weeks at Massieville, and again, in May, 1864, enlisted, this time in Company D of the One Hundred and Forty-ninth Regiment of Ohio Infantry. He accompanied this regiment to Baltimore and thence to the Virginia battleground. June 9, 1864, he was wounded, was sent to a hospital in Baltimore, and there remained until he was well enough to be removed to Camp Dennison in Ohio. August 30, 1864, he received his third discharge, this time on account of disability, and was soon back at his place as clerk in a store at Massieville.

In 1880 Mr. Huff took up the profession of photography. He operated a gallery at Colton for thirteen years, and after that was at various

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points in Southern Ohio, chiefly Ironton and Jackson, and finally went into business at Chillicothe, where he was one of the most popular men in the profession for twelve years. In 1912 he retired, and is now living at his old home in Massieville.

On September 26, 1865, soon after the war, Mr. Huff married for his first wife Mary Elizabeth Rutherford. She was born in Jackson County, Ohio, daughter of Griffith and Rachel (Radeliff) Rutherford. Mrs. Huff died in July, 1885, after almost twenty years of married life. In 1890 Mr. Huff married Mrs. Helen (Stinson) Lockwood. Mrs. Huff was born in Chillicothe May 2, 1841. Her father, Archibald Stinson, was born at High Bank, in Ross County, in 1800. Her grandfather, James Stinson, who was probably a native of Rhode Island, was one of the first pioneer settlers of Ross County. He came to this county when Ohio was still a part of Northwest Territory. He lived on the High Banks until 1801, when he settled in what is now Scioto Township, securing a large tract of land south of and adjoining the present Village of Massieville. His farm was located on the well-traveled highway

of Massieville. His farm was located on the well-traveled highway between Portsmouth and Columbus, and the large log house which he built was opened as a hotel and stage station. In the year before the building of canals or railroads and when all transportation was by wagon or team or stage coach, his hotel entertained innumerable guests, and stood in high favor with the traveling public. Archibald Stinson, the father of Mrs. Huff, was one of a large family of children, and grew up in the old hotel and on the farm, and eventually inherited a portion of the farm estate. He was a successful farmer and placed many improvements on his land, including a set of substantial frame buildings. He lived there until his death in 1876. Archibald Stinson married Silence McCoy, whose name introduces mention of another very prominent early pioneer family of Ross County. She was born in

very prominent early pioneer family of Ross County. She was born in Union Township in 1801, a daughter of John and Margaret (Kerr) McCoy. John McCoy had the distinction of erecting the first building in Chillicothe. The mother of Mrs. Huff died in 1888, having reared seven children, named James K., John, Mary, Margaret, Helen, George W. and Archibald S.

Mrs. Huff grew up in Ross County, receiving her education in the district schools. She first married Theodore E. Lockwood. Mr. Huff by his first marriage reared three children, named Dora, Anna and William R. Dora, who married Samuel Eisnawgle, died leaving two children, named Jessie and Nina. Anna is the wife of Richard Glenroy and has a daughter named Florence. William R. has the following children: Lester, Franklin, Wilber and Marjorie. Politically Mr. Huff is a republican, as would be natural considering his effective service to support the Union during the Civil war. While a resident of Colton, President Harrison appointed him postmaster of that village, and he filled the office with credit four years.

- Mary Elizabeth Rutherford Huff and
- Helen (Stinson) Lockwood Huff

Mary Elizabeth Rutherford: Mother to William Lockwood Huff

- Married: Thomas Huff September 26, 1865
- **Died:** July 1885

With this time frame since William Lockwood Huff was born in 1875, then his mother would have been Mary Elizabeth Rutherford.

This is consistent with his obituary, which stated that he was the son to Thomas and Mary Rutherford Huff.

Helen Huff: Stepmother to William Lockwood Huff

Born: May 2, 1841

Based on the source above, Thomas Huff then married Helen (Stinson) Lockwood in 1890.

This would be 5 years after the death of Mary Elizabeth Rutherford.

This would make Helen Huff a Stepmother to William Lockwood Huff.

And at least a second wife to Thomas Huff.

As you will find later in the articles, the Huffs went to many social events involving the Stinsons.

This would also appear to be supported by the following article from the Chillicothe Gazette.

In the obituary for Mary Elizabeth Stinson, sister to Mrs. Thomas Huff, it states that the funeral was held at the home of Mr. And Mrs. Thomas Huff on South Paint Street.

This book stated the following:

On September 26, 1865, right after the war, Thomas Huff married Mary Elizabeth Rutherford.

She died in 1885 after almost 20 years of marriage.

In his first marriage to Mary Elizabeth Rutherford, Thomas Huff had three children:

- Dora
- Anna
- William R.

NOTE:

Later in this article, "William R." is listed as having children with the names of:

- Lester
- Franklin
- Wilbur
- Marjorie

So it seems a supported opinion that the "William R" referenced in the article is actually "William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942)", since this William Huff also had children named Lester, Franklin, Wilbur, and Marjorie.

William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) actually had additional children of Beulah and William Huff, Jr,

But it is probably important to remember that this book was published in 1917, and:

- **Beulah Huff** was born in 1919, which would have been AFTER the book's publication date, and
- Will Huff Jr. was born in 1916 in Owensboro, Kentucky,

Possibly as a result of Will Huff Jr's birth being out of state, or that it possibly happened while the book was being processed for printing, would be why his name would have been left out of the book.

Among other reasons.

As the follow-up to that opinion, this would mean that William Lockwood Huff 1875-1942 actually did have siblings from his father's first wife.

In 1890, Thomas Huff married Helen (Stinson) Lockwood.

Other articles from the Chillicothe Gazette (below) would also indicate that William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) was NOT an only child.

A. HOW MANY DAUGHTERS WERE THERE?

One of the many frustrations in this project was trying to sort out the number of contradictions I found to any singular piece of information.

I would find several newspaper articles that would state a specific event happened in a specific year, and then find in an obituary stating that the event supposedly happened in a different year entirely.

Or vice versa.

One of the many topics where these apparent contradictions were evident was in trying to determine how many daughters William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) actually had.

Pretty much every obituary of an immediate family member, or any article completed as a partial biography, only ever listed 2 daughters:

- Beulah
- Marjorie

However, Ancestry.com lists 3 daughters, with the third daughter's name listed as "Annie Ople Huff".

Annie's birth year is listed as 1909 in that article, which would also be the same birth year as Wilbur Huff, and both of these dates provided by Ancestry.com.

That specific situation is certainly possible, but not felt to be likely.

However, a conflicting article from the **January 20, 1908** edition of the **Chillicothe Gazette** states:

"Margaret W. The 2-year old daughter of Mr. And Mrs. W.L. Huff of Park Street died at 9:00 Sunday morning.

Death was due to pneumonia with which the child had been ill for but a few days"

While I cannot be 100% certain based on this limited information that this January 20, 1908 Chillicothe Gazette article is about the Will Huff I am after in this research, the following information certainly make it probable:

1. The Huffs married in 1897.

Yes, I realize that this doesn't necessarily mean anything on it's own. But it helps to perhaps identify a pattern

2. Although the birth date is not listed, for the child, Margaret, to pass on January 20, 1908 at the age of 2, that would mean that she was born in either very early 1906 or almost anytime in 1905.

Since she passed on January 20, 1908, the more likely birth year would be 1905 and that she would have turned 3 later in 1908.

- **3.** The birth years of the known 6 Huff children, plus Margaret, have been listed as the following, in order:
 - a) February 17, 1899 for Lester Huff, per his obituary
 - b) July 16, 1904 for Robert Franklin "Red" Huff, per his obituary
 - c) 1905? Birth of Margaret W? (possible 3rd daughter?)
 - d) 1909 for Wilbur Huff, per Ancestry.com
 - e) June 23, 1913 for Marjory Huff per her obituary
 - f) January 23, 1916 for William Huff Jr., per his obituary
 - g) January 13, 1919 for Beulah Huff per her obituary

So, the Huffs perhaps having another daughter in 1905, or even very early in 1906, to make a total of 7 children and not six, is certainly possible in this time line.

It is noted that the name of this possible third daughter doesn't match up between the Gazette article and the information on Ancestry.com, However, in this research project, it was uncommon to find the full and correct names of the children in any article found, anyway.

It is unclear which of these versions, 7 children or only 6, is true if either of them ultimately is, anyway.

However, one of the more significant pieces of information that appears to come from the January 20,

1908 article from the Chillicothe Gazette which stated that "Margaret W. " has passed at the age of 2, is that the Huff's were listed in this article as being on **Park Street.**

In tracking the residences of the Huff's in Chillicothe since they seemed to move around a lot, I listed in **Chapter 17**, **Residences** every full or partial residence I could find for the Huff's as listed in these articles.

The excerpt below are just the residences listed that involved Park Street and 1908.

And remembering that the newspaper article had the 2 year old daughter of "Mr. And Mrs. W.L. Huff of Park Street " passing away in January 1908.

Further, the **December 14, 1908** article *(above)* from the Chillicothe Gazette appears to be the most significant to this question, since the information in it shows that:

- THIS Mrs. William Huff was hosting a "Children's Mission Band" at her home
- Lester Huff gave a cornet solo
- Franklin (*Huff?*) gave a recitation.

As the Reader will find in **Chapter 10 SONS**, Robert **Franklin** Huff and Thomas **Lester** Huff are recognized sons of Mr. William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942).

The above time line would seem to support a conclusion that would make Margaret a third daughter for the William Lockwood Huff family in addition to Beulah and Marjorie.

And NOT an "Anna Ople Huff" supposedly born in 1909.

Ultimately, the correct answer on the issue of whether William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942) had either

2 or 3 daughters is certainly NOT mission critical to the remainder of this Narrative by any means.

But combining these bits of information in order to try to arrive at an informed opinion was just another step in trying to piece together the patchwork quilt of information available from these sources on the Huff family.



Red Huff was playing in a military band he helped to start in Tunisia in 1943.

They were playing for Bob Hope when German bombers came over and bombed the stage.

Bob Hope was uninjured, but 4 musicians were killed outright and Red Huff received numerous injuries.

Red was subsequently released from the service due to the injuries, and after continued difficulties and numerous hospitalizations from them, he died in a VA Hospital in Indianapolis, Indiana two years later in 1945.



The Huffs in general were heavily involved in several churches for significant periods of time. There would often be several articles each week (yes...each week) listing their church duties and activities with what might have been their affiliated church at the moment.

However, they would also routinely travel to other churches in order to present music programs and be involved in other related activities.


They were also heavily involved in numerous church, social, and civic related groups that would regularly meet during the week.

NOTE:

The Carlisle building was built in 1885.

Ironically, that is 10 years after Mr. Huff was born.

The building is located at 9 South Paint Street, Chillicothe, Ohio.

This isn't but a few blocks away from many of his residences listed in the newspaper accounts found for this report.

The Carlisle Building is at the intersection of Main and South Paint Street, in Chillicothe, and is on the diagonal corner from the Ross County Courthouse.

Unfortunately, the building was gutted by a fire in 2003 due to vandalism.

Subsequent failed attempts at restoration, the ravages of time on a building being empty for years, plus other devastating influences resulted in continued deterioration of the structure to the point that many thought it should be razed for safety and that it would be impossible to save anything.

Fortunately, the exterior of the building was able to be saved and a complete and successful renovation of the inside was completed.

As a result, in 2015 the building was re-opened with space dedicated for medical offices and apartments.

From a major fire in 2003 that threatened the future of the entire structure to a grand re-opening and re-purposing of a key building in the downtown Chillicothe landscape and history in 12 years.





CHAPTER 17: RESIDENCES

A. INTRODUCTION

This is certainly just one more topic of confusion in trying to recreate the life and times of the family of William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942).

The Huff obituary stated that he had been a resident of Ross County all of his life.

However, several articles, including the Wind Repertory Project, stated that Will Huff traveled a great deal and lived in many different cities in Ohio, as well as in several others out of state.

In apparent support of the several articles found listing Will Huff's extensive travels, many of the cities and states mentioned in those sources were actually listed as either birth cities or residences in the obituaries of the following Will Huff children.

- Thomas Lester Huff's obituary states specifically that he was born in Ironton, Ohio in 1899, and that when he was 15 years old (1914?), he was the pianist for the theater in Owensburg, Kentucky, where the family lived.
- Marjorie Huff was born in Suffolk, Virginia
- Beulah Huff was born in Stearns, Kentucky
- William Huff Jr, was born in Owenboro, Kentucky
- Robert Franklin "Red" Huff was born in Williamson, West Virginia

That all of these children have different birth cities and residences listed is not exactly the record you would expect from someone who actually had lived in Ross County all his life, as was stated in his obituary.

And the list of clear contradictions to this statement from sources that I would have otherwise thought to be credible goes on and on.

Regardless, the following are the addresses, and sometimes just the general locations, of the residences listed for either Will Huff or Mrs. Eleanor Huff (wife) from all of these sources.

Just for clarity, it just needs to be repeated that sometimes the newspapers are very clear that any specific person with the last name of "Huff" mentioned any article is a member of the direct family line for William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942).

However, sometimes the articles do NOT provide enough information to be sure.

QUESTION: Is someone with the name "Huff" in this article:

- Mentioned as a Director of the IOOF Band?....Yep...that's the one I want
- Mentioned as Director for the Meaco Band?.....Yep...that's him too
- Mentioned with any of multiple children with the names of Franklin, Lester, Marjorie, Beulah, William, or Wilbur?......Yep...also him
- Mentioned just as "Will Huff', "W.L. Huff", or any other variation, in a short notice of a real estate transfer? Or a tax debt?...Maybe....Maybe not....it's pretty unclear.
- Mentioned as the Composer of any of the several songs known to have been composed by William Lockwood Huff (1875-1942)?....Oh yeah...we are good to go on that one, too.

However, if mistakes were made by including any newspaper articles in this Narrative that should ultimately be proven that they should <u>not</u> have been added, then I accept responsibility that these mistakes were mine to have been made.

But they were honest mistakes.



It should be noted that there is some confusion resulting from these articles on a few of the entries.

A couple of the musical groups that Will Huff either started or directed had no names listed for them in the articles found, and in the apparent beginning stages of the groups.

Plus, the possibility exists that either the person providing the information to the Reporter, or the Reporter on his/her own, innocently interchanged the words "orchestra" and "band".

Generally, they are used to denote musical groups with different instrumentations....but not always.

Regardless, whenever a new group was found listed in the newspaper articles, it was listed here.

However, for me, since this was an interesting choice for a band name from Southern Ohio, I tried to research it.

Mr, Bierley stated in "Hallelujah Trombone! The Story of Henry Fillmore" that the "Foradora Band" of Wellston was started in 1901.

However, I could not a direct connection of anything named "Floradra" to Wellston,

Ohio.

But in researching Ohio newspapers from 1900 to 1902, I found that "Floradora" was:

- The name of a very poplar comedy musical which started in London in 1899 and came to New York in 1900. Written by Owen Hall, with music by Leslie Stuart, additional songs by Paul Rubin, and lyrics by Edward Boyd-Jones, George Arthurs and Rubens. The women in the chorus line were dubbed "Floradora Girls".
- Between 1900 and 1902 newspapers.com had 139 references to Floradora in the Ohio newspapers it had archived. This included someone singing songs from the musical, to someone putting on the entire musical. The term was also used to describe figurines in sale ads, a type of comb, cigars, a type of hat, a type of scarf, and several other things.

• While none of this information is conclusive as to why the Wellston band was given that name, maybe it offers some hints as to why.....it was obviously a very popular musical of the time and the word was often used to describe types of apparel and numerous items.

Because it is a fairly short summary encompassing his entire life in just a few paragraphs, it is provided intact here as a kind of intro to the remaining documents

William (Will) Lockwood Huff (16 January 1875, Massieville, Ohio – 5 November 1942, Chillicothe, Ohio) was an American composer.

This Will Huff is not to be confused with the name Will Huff that composer Henry Fillmore sometimes used as a pseudonym. They are separate composers.

Huff's father was a photographer, and in his early manhood Will also worked in this profession. For the remainder of his life, he was an interior decorator, specializing in wallpaper hanging and painting. He was not a full-time professional musician except for a brief period when trouping with a circus band.

As a youth in Coalton, Ohio, Huff played in his first band, being one of the organizers of what the town folks called the "Kid's Band." He exhibited outstanding music talent, first on the alto horn and then the cornet. Eventually, he established a reputation as one of the finest cornetists in that part of the country.

He played with an Ohio National Guard band but did not serve **o**n active duty. This came about during the Spanish-American War when he lived in Ironton, Ohio. There, he performed with the 17th Regiment Band. It was in Ironton that he first tried his hand at composition, his first effort being a march dedicated to the 17th Regiment band. He sent the manuscript to Rudolf Wurlitzer, a small music publisher in Cincinnati.

Patriotism was never at a more feverish pitch in the United States than during the Spanish-American War, and the time was right for marches with military titles. Wurlitzer published the 17th Regiment Band March plus Huff's Battleship Maine March and Canadian Club March in May, 1899. He received only five dollars for each march, but he was pleased to be a published composer. Throughout his life, he was known as a modest, non-aggressive man, and some felt that publishers took advantage of him.

During his middle years, Huff traveled about quite a bit. Wherever he moved, he organized and conducted bands. In addition, he taught privately, because the members of his bands were almost always beginners. He did this not only in Ohio but also in several small towns in Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, and Illinois. After World War I, he settled in Chillicothe, Ohio, and was appointed director of what was his finest band, the Odd Fellows (IOOF) Band.

His move to Chillicothe came about through an invitation to organize an employees' band for the Mead Pulp and Paper Company [Meaco]. The band was dissolved after a few months, and some of the better musicians joined Huff's IOOF band.

Will Huff was a popular local figure in his twilight years, and the bands he directed always drew sizable crowds at Yoctangee Park in Chillicothe. Each year, he dedicated a new march to one of the band's sponsors.

Huff's career as a composer can be separated roughly into five periods. In the first period, from 1899-1908, he published with the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company. The next period, beginning in 1908, and by far the most important, was when he was associated with the Fillmore Brothers Company. For reasons not fully understood, he broke away from Fillmore, and beginning in 1915, published with Will H. Smith of Dixon, Illinois. During the late 1920s, his music was published by the Star Music Company of Eldred, Pennsylvania. Thereafter, his music went unpublished.

He composed very little during the last decade of his life. He was content to perform occasionally with various bands in southern Ohio, making music with the many musician friends who thought so highly of him.

A total of 62 marches and other short compositions have been accredited to Huff, but because a number of unpublished marches have not been accounted for, the total number of his works might exceed 90.

Later that day he felt better.

FRIDAY:

On Friday, Hathaway felt good enough to go back to the studio. On his way, he got a plumber and they both went into the basement so Hathaway could show the plumber where the leak was.

After a short time, Hathaway again became ill and suffered another hemorrhage of the stomach.

It took at least an hour or more for him to feel good enough to go home. Once home, and he suffered much weakness and had another attack during the night.

SATURDAY:

On Saturday, Hathaway had another attack.

SUNDAY:

On Sunday, Hathaway rested well until evening when he had another attack.

MONDAY:

On Monday, Hathaway fell good enough to come down the stairs.

In the evening he suffered another attack. He passed away in the night.

The final determination was that Hathaway's death was due to the violent retching caused by partial asphyxiation which must have ruptured several blood vessels in the stomach.

- 6) The males had been told that they needed to give up the name of the guilty party, or pay \$5.00 and costs.
- 7) The guilty party (Ed) was named and when the 5 who did NOT yell out those

words went to the Mayor, they were not allowed to say a word, they were called "loafers' and fined the limit.

8) "Ed" didn't appear in court.

Mrs. Huff ends her letter with the words "Some case-some law."
